Target Population

Our focused target groups are People with Disabilities and their Parents, Children, released Bonded Labour, Migrants, Returnee Migrants, Potential Migrants, Persons with Mental illness and their Caretakers, farmers, Aggrieved Consumers at micro level and we focused on service providers, institutions, civil society organizations, duty bearers, Networks, Federations, Media Persons at macro level in our different interventions and programmes.

Alternative Forms of Care and Support Programme for Children without Parental Care and Other Vulnerable Children

The “Alternative forms of Care and support programme for children without parental care and other vulnerable children” has launched in the month of May 2013 with the support from the Stichting Kindpostzegels Nederland. The programme is directly working with children living without adequate parental Care and other vulnerable children at the Grampanchayat with an approach ensure that children in need of care and protection have opportunities and access to services that help them to exercise their rights to survival, development, protection and participation as well as full participation in a family-based care and community. At present the programme is continuing as “*Child centered family focus Programme*” with community based approach. Currently the programme is being implemented intensively in eight Grampanchayats namely Rengali, Chhakormal, Lachhipur, Khaliapali, Mayurudan and Mallikmunda under Sonapur Block of Subarnapur District and Gudvela Deulgudi and Ghuna Gram Panchayat under Gudvela Block of Bolangir District in the State of Odisha. In the year 2021-2022 the RARE is directly working with 212 vulnerable families and their children in need of care & protection especially children without parental care, orphan and other vulnerable children. The programme has worked to improve the socio-economic status of the supported families and children with regard to care and protection at family, institution (AWC/School) and community engaging the community actively in the entire process of the programme. It is the one of the key values of the programme which we are practicing that not to refer the directly target children and their families as the receivers of service rather consider and actively involve them as the partners of the programme.

Goal:

Children who are vulnerable and do not receive adequate care and protection, will live in a stable family situation, are securely attached and are developing well

Objectives:

1. There are enough foster parents/family caregivers who are equipped to offer children security, who let them grow up as normal as possible and who are able to provide appropriate care.
2. Children are resilient and have a voice in the shaping of their lives
3. The child has a good relationship with the parents/ guardians and the network surrounding the child is strengthened and committed to provide a safe environment

Achievement:

- The provision of Maintenance Package has change the live of 212 children (110 boys and 102 girls) from 120 families. As a result 17 children (7 Boys and 10 Girls) Passed 10th and enrolled in +2. 3children (2 boys and 2 girls) passed +2 and enrolled in +3. 1 child enrolled in ITI, SonepurThe periodic support to 22 children has regularized their higher education.
- Assistance in terms of kind of INR 4000 to 7000 has identified to start income source for 30 caregivers. The caregivers are involved in trade like; tailoring, goat rearing, dairy farming, grocery shop, poultry, vegetable cultivation, Vegetable Vending etc.
- 80 childrenfrom 67 families Produced at CWC Subarnapur and 89 children from 32 families produced before CWC Bolangir from Gudvela, Deulgudi and Ghuna under Gudvela Block.
- Caregivers training on skilful parenting of 106 families have been conducted in 2 units has skilled parents for caring and supporting children in post COVID period.
- Awareness workshop on child marriage provision has impacted to save life of 2 children from child marriage.
- Consultation with Adolescents club members on Child Marriage and its impact has been resulted to zero child marriage in the project implemented areas. They are well aware on SRHR, Menstrual Hygiene, Proper use of Sanitary Napkins, Appropriate health Care, aware about the Govt. facilities on SRHR and career planning.
- Due to Interaction made with the Industrial Training Institute (ITI), 81 Adolescent Club Members acquired knowledge on the different trade and other dimension of study. 64 Children got involved in ICPS structure and process.
- ICDS, Health workers and Teachers are trained on ill impact of child marriage and different forms of sexual violence. The matters are being percolated through the peer learner and teacher.
- District Level Consultation with Stakeholder like Tent House Owner, Priest, Social Leader, Manager of Band Party, DJ Party, Printing Press on Prevention of Child Marriage. 93 stakeholders Idea gained to check child marriage at their level. They will share with their other members follow the instruction to prevent child marriage. 62 Child marriage is reported before the date of marriage. As a result the child marriage ratio Reduced from 22% to 16 % in the district as per the NFHS-5 data.
- Meeting with the member of Panchayati Raj institution has impacted more on the continuation of “*A Day for Children*” Programme.
- The children festival is impacted for optimum participation of Children.

5. Case story

Caption: Gouri's Glory

Gouri Jhankar is a vulnerable single woman from Gadia Village of Mallikmunda Gram Panchayat under Sonapur Block of Subarnapur District. She has three sons (ChakraJhankar 21, Mantu Jhankar 13 & Pintu Jhankar 16 years). Her husband unfortunately died due to Heart Attack. After the death of earning person of the family, the condition was so worst to manage. The only sources of the family income through daily wage labour. She forced to mortgage the incomplete PMAY after death of her husband due to financial crisis. Her elder son dropped out after his father's death and started working as labourer. Younger brother Mantu also dropout from school and started working in his family agriculture field.

The family was identified by VLCPC and informed to Programme Associate of Alternative Child Care Programme, Sri Sushanta Sa regarding the issues and the VLCPC Member Head Master Sarbeswar Mishra informed to RARE Staff Sushanta Sa to produced Mantu Jhankar before Child Welfare Committee (CWC), after that her family supported through Alternative Child Care Programme of RARE and receives Maintenance Packages of nutrition, healthcare, hygiene and Education material each month by that the child can be safe and healthy. Mantu again went to school to continue his education.

Further, Sushanta Sa motivates to start Income Generation Activities through Livelihood Support. Gouri decided that she will invest the supported money for Vegetable Cultivation. After that a need assessment for the vocation was done and started the vocation. She earns profits up to 40,000 from vegetable cultivation.



After that her business started improving. The family earns profit worth of Rs. 200 – 250 daily through the business. Livelihood support helps her family to increase the family income and running the expenses and education of two children smoothly.

Gouri express choice of right business has turned her life happy. She expressed her gratitude to VLCPC, RARE and SKN for the timely support.

CHILDLINE 1098

CHILDLINE 1098 is a service of Ministry of Women and Child Development. CHILDLINE India Foundation is a non-government organization. CHILDLINE works for the protection of rights of all children aged from 0 to 18.

VISION: A child-friendly nation that guarantees the rights and protection of all children

MISSION: CHILDLINE aims to reach out to every child in need and ensure their rights and protection. Our four Cs model – Connect, Catalyze, Collaborate and Communicate – is the system that enables us to reach out to more and more children, every year.

INITIATION OF CHILDLINE SUBARNAPUR

CHILDLINE Started in Subarnapur District from 31st August 2020. So far CHILDLINE cover all 6 blocks in Saharanpur with special focus of outreach and awareness.

The CHILDLINE Inaugurated on 1st September 2021, which was attended by the Superintendent of Police Sri Debi Prasad Das, Member of Juvenile Justice Sri Chhabila Karna, District Child Protection Officer Sri Chaturbhuj Dash and founder Mr.Gourishyam Panda. The program was launched with a commitment to the CHILDLINE vision and Mission.

1. Outreach and Awareness

CHILDLINE Subarnapur Conducted Outreach and Awareness program in all blocks of Subarnapur District. Through outreach the team does Door to door /Face to face outreach to reach out to all section of society and our important stakeholders in the community with an intention to promote the idea of Child rights and aware people about the services provided by CHILDLINE. Till 2022, RARE have reached up to 10,107 children and 6057 adults in the district through door-to-door interactions. Apart from regular outreach programs, we also organize community and city level awareness program in form of stakeholder meetings ,Street play, Wall posters ,



painting and rallies and formed 21 nos. of Child club in all blocks and conducted 29 nos. of meeting with children clubs.

2. Open house programme

CHILDLINE team Conducted three Open house programme On 18th Jan 2022, 26th Feb 2022 and 17.03.22 at Salepali-Ulunda, Hood-Ulunda, Pandakital –Sonepur respectively. The Open house programme is aimed at letting children and adolescent speak out their problems freely without any family/community pressure. Some of the issues those were raised during our Open house programme were:



- Access to drinking water and schools in their community.
- Access to Anganwadi in their community.
- Access to toilet and drinking water facility at schools.

These issues were raised with local administration, including DEO, CDPO and Collector. They assured us swift response to these issues.

3. Special day celebration

The CHILDLINE team celebrates every special occasion, such as Independence day, Republic Day, Gandhi Jayanti, and Children’s Day, Netaji Jayanti, National Youth day, National Girl child day, International Mother language day, International women’s day, National Immunization day, World forestry day, World water day and World Tuberculosis day with the community and with participation of the stakeholders as a platform for all to assemble and discuss on prevalent child related issues and how can we address this effectively by collaborating. We have build rapport with our stakeholders like Sarpanch, Ward members, Anganwadi worker, ASHA, Police, etc to assist CHILDLINE team in identifying Child related malpractice or mishaps.



CHILDLINE also celebrated district level International Human Rights Day on 10th of December, 2021 in presence of our founder, Mr. Gourishyam Panda, Mr. Gouranga Mohapatra, State Conveynor Jan Swasthya Abhiyaan, and Mr. Swadheen Meher, District Corespondence, SAMAJ.

On 11th October, 2021, CHILDLINE Team attended International Girl Child Day at Collectorate, Subarnapur, organised by DCPU. In the program all line department were present. The theme of the meeting was to prevent Child marriage and promote education, especially among girls

4. Programme at District level:

- On 27th July, 2021, a District task force on Child marriage and orientation on Ashirbad scheme was held at Collectorate, Subarnapur. The meeting was attended by Hon'ble Collector, DSW, CWC Chairperson, Police personal, CDPO, DPO, DEO AND CHILDLINE Team. In the meeting CHILDLINE Team was asked to collaborate with line department on rescue to Child marriage victims, Identify orphans eligible for linking them with Ashirbad scheme
- On 22nd September 2021, on the occasion of “A day for Children” a district level task force meeting On Elimination of Child and Adolescent labor was organised. The meeting was attended by Hon'ble Collector, SP Subarnapur, DySP, Subarnapur, DSW, DLO,DEO and CWC members. The meeting was organized by DCPU. In the meeting DLO presented the status of Child labor. All line department were asked to collaborate with DLO and CHILDLINE in rescuing Child labor.

- On 21st December 2021, on the occasion of “ A day for children “ a district task force on prevention of Child marriage cum DCPC meeting was held at Collectorate,Subarnapur.The meeting was attended by Hon'ble Collector, Deputy Collector, CWC Member, DSWO, DIPRO, DSP,CDPOs of all block, AWW,SAKHI team and CHILDLINE TEAM and adolescent children. In this meeting the collector distributes 5 nos.ofcheques to Ashirwad beneficiaries.Three girls,who were continuing education at ITI,Sonepur were awarded with financial assistance under BijuShishuSurakyaYojana.On this day CHILDLINE Advisory board was constitutes.BalyaBibahPratirodh Mancha was also Constitutes and CHILDLINE was part of it.



- District level consultations on prevention of Child marriage was organized by RARE in Subarnapur on 8th December,2021 and 23rd March,2022. Discussion was held on role of AWW and Supervisors on rescue in Child marriage cases and what support and collaboration, CHILDLINE Team requires from ICDS and other line department. On 23rd March, 2022 during the District level consultation in Collectorate office. Hon'ble Collector asked the CDPO to rescue and produce all Child marriage cases with CWC.



5.Block Level Meetings/ Program

- On 22nd September,2021 “A day for Children-cum- BLCPC meeting” was held in Birmaharajpur, Ulunda and Sonepur. The meeting was attended by BDO,teachers, BSSO, CDPO, LS,DC, AWW and CHILDLINE Team. Discussion was held on identify drop out children and how can CHILDLINE collaborate with block Level departments to enroll them in schools and prevent Child marriage.

- On 12th December, 2021 “A day for Children-cum-BLCPC meeting in Sonepur, and Dungripali block. The meeting was attended by BDO, teachers, BSSO, CDPO, LS, DC, AWW and CHILDLINE Team. Discussion was held on the reporting mechanism for rescuing Child marriage and abuse victim.

- On 22nd March, 2022 “A day for Children-cum-BLCPC meeting” was held in Sonepur, Ulunda, Binka, Dungripali, Birmaharajpur and Tarbha block. The meeting was attended by BDO, teachers, BSSO, CDPO, LS, DC, AWW, Tehsildar, BEO and CHILDLINE Team. Discussion was held on the reporting mechanism for rescuing Child marriage and abuse victim.



- On 27th March, 2022 “A Block level Workshop with Media Personnel” was organised by CHILDLINE at Birmaharajpur. The program was attended by News reporters, Advocate and Volunteers of RARE, Sonepur. Discussion was held on the Functions of CHILDLINE 1098 Service and different issues of children’s and its prevention.

6. Panchayat Level and Village level Meetings

On 22nd December, “A day for Children-cum- PLCPC meeting was held in Jananara and subsequently in Khaliapali, Ulunda, Hilung, Charbhara, Bhimtikra, Sndhurpur GPS on 22nd and 23rd March, 2022, respectively. Discussion was held on Child related issues like Child marriage, drop out and Child abuse. On similarly lines, VLCPC meeting was held in Rugudipali on 28th Jan 2022.

7. Training Programs

- On 7th & 8th of June 2021 a training program was conducted by CIF for CHILDLINE team through virtual mode on Trauma - informed counselling and Self care for the counselor.
- On 23rd June 2021, CIF organized a training of CHILDLINE staff on violence against children
- On 16th July 2021 a webinar was organized by CIF for CHILDLINE team on child protection and child rights during covid 19 - Psycho social support for children.
- On 29th Dec 2021 a virtual training program was organised for CHILDLINE Team on child fund



begging by CIF.

- On 25th march attend One day orientation training for the functionaries of Child helpline of Odisha organised by OSCPS at Bhubaneswar.

8. Training program with Stakeholders



During this financial year, CHILDLINE team also organised 20 training programs with Teachers, AWW, ASHA and SHGs on Child protection and Child rights in all block of Subaranapur district and reached 518 AWW, 80 SHG members, 450 teachers and 280 ASHA.

9. Case Interventions

In this financial year 332 cases intervened out of that 2 cases related to Children facing medical issues, 260 cases related to Sponsorship, 3 missing Child Case, 1 case involving Child sexual abuse, 4 cases of Corporal punishment, 12 cases of rehabilitation under CCI, 1 Child was restored with her family, 5 Children were given with Nutrition kits and 1 child was re-enrolled. 1 case of deaddiction counseling, 25 Child marriage cases, 13 cases of child labor and forced Beggary and 4 cases of Child trafficking.



10. CHILDLINE Se Dosti Program

CHILDLINE Subaranapur organized CHILDLINE SE DOSTI WEEK from 14.11.21 to 20.11.21. The objective of the programme was to aware the children about their rights with full Fun and Joyful environment. The program was observed from and during this period CHILDLINE team visited children groups in communities and children groups in communities and organized various playful competitions like Drawing and song



Competition Rangoli, and Quiz competitions in community as well as in CCIs. On 14th November Signature Campaign to ask our participants to lend their support to the drive in preventing Child abuse. was organized in Khaliapali. A city wide Rathajatra was organized to spread awareness on

CHILDLINE services. The Ratha was inaugurated by Mr. Hemant Ku. Padhi, Adll. SP, Subarnapur. Similarly a rally on “Prevention of Child Marriage” was launched from ICDS office to Townhall. The CHILDLINE Team also visited various district and block office and tied CHILDLINE se Dosti band as a gesture of cooperation and collaboration.

11.Psycho Social Support Activities:

The purpose of the Psycho social activities is to provide parents, caregivers, support persons, children and adolescent themselves, a tool that will enable them to understand COVID-19 and its prevention measures. The tool is also designed to help children against stress, fear and anxiety. The activities are designed for two different age cohorts: 6 to 10, and 11 to 19. We reached about 970 children from 56 villages in 6 blocks, during which, we conducted several innovative activities, that includes “Drawing your covid heroes”, “sharing of Daily diary”, “telling about your buddy”.

DISHA CUM VIKAAS CENTRE

DISHA Centre is an early intervention and school readiness Centre for Children with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Intellectual Disability & Multiple Disabilities between the age of 0-25 years.

The Centre aims at early identification, intervention and school readiness. The services provided in the Centre are early identification and intervention, physiotherapy, speech therapy, Nutritional food, Activities of Daily Living, special education, counselling services, referral services, provision of positioning and assistive devices, inclusion in school and different scheme and programme by a team of trained, skilled and professionals. Free transport facility is provided to the children for attending the Centre regularly. 40 children are enrolled and availing services from the Centre.

SWABALAMBAN-DAY CARE THERAPY CENTER

Person with some different type of disability like Intellectual Disability, Cerebral Palsy, Autism and Multiple disabilities are neglected more due the lack of knowledge regarding these types of disability and specific rehabilitative measures and extent of the same needed for these people. Again the problem is worse for such people living in rural and backward area where the special service for them is not available. Hence to cater the need of these categories of disable we are implementing a Project entitled “Swabalamban-Day Care Therapy Centre” for the children with Autism, Intellectual Disability, Cerebral Palsy and Multiple Disabilities with the financial support from Social Security and

Empowerment for PWDs Govt. of Odisha, with all required aids, appliances and qualified experts in the concern field.

The objective of the centre is to provide therapeutic and rehabilitative services and enhance the interpersonal and vocational skill. 99 children with disabilities avail the services on daily basis.

- A Van has been moving named “Bhinakshyama Seva O Sahayata Express” to the villages in every Saturday. The objective of the express is to disseminate the information on DCTC, early identification of CWDs and provide therapeutic services at door step.
- 75% parents are doing exercise at home and support their child in the rehabilitative process.
- Due to awareness meeting and mobile van Services local health service provider and doctors are referring the child to the centre for therapeutic and rehabilitative services.

COMMUNITY BASED REHABILITATION PROGRAMME FOR THE PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

Community Based Rehabilitation Programme for Person with Disabilities is being implemented by RARE since 2011 at 6 Gram Panchayat of Tarva Block of Subarnapur District and 5 Gram Panchayat of Gudvela Block of Bolangir District with 1047 persons with disabilities. The project aims to undertake socio-economic rehabilitation of persons (including children) with various disabilities, building their agency, strengthening and demonstrating services for disabled people and making the community and government systems sensitive and responsive to the problems of persons with disabilities

- Rs 35000/- have been deposited in Bank by 15 SHG out of their profit.

- 120 Persons with Disabilities have applied for job under MGNREGS and getting job guarantee card
- 20 Persons with Disabilities have got house under Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana.
- 60 Persons with Disabilities have got Buss Pass and Train Pass
- 812 have got new Disability certificate under UDID.

COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH AND DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME (Strengthening Community Based Integrative Care of People with Mental Illness)

RARE has been working on Community Mental Health and Development Programme since 2018 in Subarnapur District with the Support of Basic Needs India, Bangaluru. The programme aims at improved human rights of people with mental illness, reduced stigma and discrimination in community and resource enhancement of all stakeholders. The Programme is being implemented in Subarnapur District, targeting 500 Persons living with mental illness. 25 Community Volunteers are engaged in the process for identification, facilitating the process of treatment & access to entitlement; provide psychosocial education and referral services to PWMIs. On the other hand, periodical meeting have been conducted to activate the local health service provider such as ASHA, ANM and AWW on mental health to identify and provide referral services.

- 41 have received disability certificate, 41 have got pension and 32 have got PM Awas Yojana/Mo Kudia/Biju Pakka Yojna
- 10 Family support group have been formed with regular meeting for strengthening
- 107 ASHA and AWW actively involved in Identification referrals and follow up process

- 425 caregiver and 290 PWMI's have aware on psychosocial education

Special activities under the Programme:

Health Camp was organised on 30th October, 2021 at Panchayat Office of Shankara. In this Health Camp total 65 PWMI's treated, new PWMI's 20 & old PWMI's 45. In the health camp a counseling center was set up by the trained counselor. 25 PWMI with their caretaker were counseled. Psychiatrist Dr. Ananta Charan Meher for consultation and guidance on the uses of Medicine. With the cooperation of staff members of RARE and volunteers of Mental Health programme it could able to reach 25 People with Mental Illness and their families.

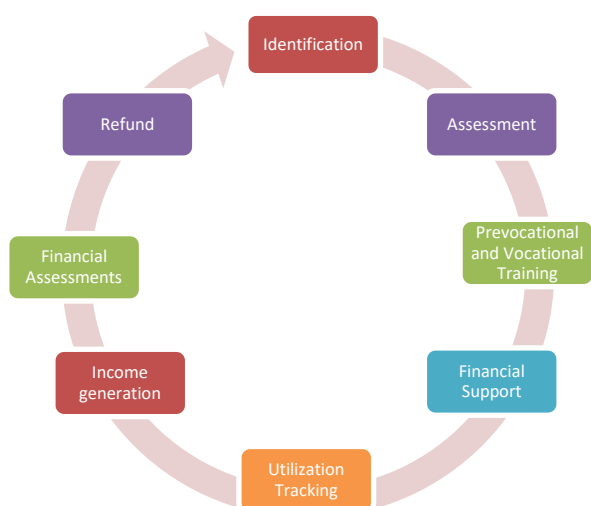

SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOOD

RARE believes that economic rehabilitation is the root for sustainable development of individuals, families as well as communities. Taking this issue as concern RARE has taken this as cross cutting theme in the context of disabilities, mental health and child rights. We believe that livelihood is sustainable when it enables people to cope with and recover from shocks and stresses from economic or social upheavals and enhances their well-being. RARE has put effort to bring the Sustainable Livelihood development option among the families of Mental illness and PWDs as well as care giver of child without parental care.

Keeping the economic issues, RARE has been implemented various programmes under the livelihood themes with the support from Basic needs India, Banglore, Federation of Disabled peoples and parent's organisation, Tarva and Stitching Kinderpostzegels, Netherland, Paul Hamlyn Foundation, UK aiming to empower the families with PWDs & Mental Illness to enable them to enhance their food security, increasing their incomes and improve their quality of life through financial assistance to engage in income generation activities keeping in the mind of local market, local resources, and linkages with the government schemes & programme.

- 30 families of persons with disability have been provided financial support of Rs 121000/- for Income generation activities. Increased the income up to 350 per day.

Consumer Protection and Consumer Awareness is one of the major activities of RARE since its inception. Our aim to disseminate the information about Consumer Protection Act and aware the rural consumer for protection of their rights and get their grievance redress accordingly. To promote a strong consumer movement in rural and urban area of the district different activities on consumer issues was carried out by RARE with the support from Food Supplies and Consumer Welfare Department, Government of Odisha through the Assistance Controller of Legal Metrology office of District administration, subarnapur.

CONSUMER RIGHTS ACTIVITIES IN THE STATE OF ODISHA:

The programme Hiring Consumer Rights Agency in the State of Odisha Started by Research Academy for Rural Enrichment (RARE), Sonapur with the support from Nutrition International, CANADA from 11th December, 2020 with the cooperation of Voluntary Consumer Organization of Odisha.

I. Project background

Iodine is a micronutrient required in a very minute quantity (150 – 250 microgram/day). Iodine deficiency results in a wide array of preventable disorders and disabilities collectively known as Iodine Deficiency Disorders (IDD). Edible salt is considered an ideal vehicle for the delivery of iodine in the human body because of its daily and universal consumption by everyone irrespective of age, location, and socioeconomic status. Moreover, the iodization of salt is technically feasible and economically affordable.

The India Iodine Survey 2018-19 revealed that 76.3% of the households were consuming adequately iodized salt at the National level and 65.8 % at the state level. There is limited knowledge amongst the retailers, wholesalers, and consumers on the need to consume adequately iodized salt. The consumers do not have any specific tool which would help them differentiate iodized salt from non-iodized salt or an inadequately iodized one and that they may prefer indicators such as price, whiteness, free flow, saltiness, etc. over iodine content, for the purchase of edible salt.

- II. Testing of Salt Samples at Organization Iodine testing Laboratory at Subarnapur.
- III. Validation of Salt samples Result with the NABL Kalyani Laboratories Pvt Ltd, Bhubaneswar a government approved Iodine testing lab.
- IV. MIS based data upload to the funding agency's web portal.
- V. Introduction to RARE with the administration for further advocacy process

- VIII. Finding the salt supply chain from other state to Odisha

➤ **Key Achievements**

- I. All the 30 Voluntary Consumer Organization were collect the salt sample from every corner of the district and block as well to submit the samples to RARE, Sonapur as per the contract.
 - II. RARE has own Iodine salt testing laboratories at Subarnapur and a trained Lab chemist for testing the Iodine content through Iodometric titration process.
 - III. As one of the most vital role of Consumer Organization, RARE has validated the data with the NBAL laboratories to confirm the data accuracy and further advocacy process.
 - IV. Due to the regular flow of salt collection RARE has to update the web data as per the agreement and it's up to date for fruitful information for donor agency and for all the VCO in Odisha for advocacy purpose.
 - V. Advocacy is the main part of this project, because RARE has initiate the programme for strengthen to Consumer about Iodine salt and it's important.
 - VI. Successfully collaborate with state and district level health department to ensure the avail the standard iodized salt in the state as well as all the 30 districts of Odisha.
 - VII. Regular advocacy with National Iodine Deficiency Disorder Control Programme (NIDDP) cell at state department and follow up to priority districts where RARE found sub-standard salt as per the lab and NABL data result after testing of the salt samples.
 - VIII. Quarterly basis result sharing meeting has conducted by Project Coordinator and RARE team with the ADM-cum-DCPO and CDM&PHO along with Food Safety Officers for maintain the standard salt in the district and regular collect Legal Samples from the interior pocket to know the exact quality of salt and its Iodine content.
- I. RARE has initiated a lot of Community sensitization programme and state level networking programme, the programmers' details are given below;
- On 5th March 2022 RARE had organized a State level Network Partners Meet with Voluntary Consumer Organizations (VCOs) was organized at CYSD Bhubaneswar involving the VCOs Chairperson and



Contact Person. NI's National and State focal along with Consumer Rights Activist Mr. Gourishyam Panda discussed with the participants on the importance of consuming Iodized salt and related to law on Iodised salt.

- On dated 15th of March 2022, Research Academy for Rural Enrichment (RARE) held a "World Consumer Rights Day Observation at Umadevi secondary School, Kadodar with the support of District Administration Subarnapur. In this program. There were 80 participants including staff and students. The theme for the year was "Fair Digital Finance". In the programme Founder of RARE Mr. Gourishyam Panda, Sarapanch of Kadodar Gram Panchayat, ACSO Head quarter and Principal of Umadevi Higher Secondary School and State Consumer Rights Programme Coordinator of RARE Sri Saroj Karan were joined and aware to the students on fair digital finance and consumer protection act.
- National Consumer Day observed on dated 24th December 2021 at Block Conference Hall, Dunglepali on the Theme Tackling Plastic Pollution in the presence of Founder of RARE Mr. Gourishyam Panda, ABDO Sri Ananda Chandra Mishra, BSSO Aswini Pande and other dignitaries like AWWs, Lawyers, farmer, Student, CRP and representative from Civil Society Organizations were present. In the programme 70 participants were present.
- Through consumer counseling centre 17 nos. of cases were address and counseled for mutual understanding by the consumer counselor Sri Sudam Gaigaria.

BHINNAKSHYAMA SEVA O SAHAYATA EXPRESS

Children with disabilities are subject to multiple deprivations and limited opportunities in several dimensions of their lives. Their families and caregivers also go through lot of stress and challenges in having a person with disability due to unavailability of therapeutic and rehabilitation services. People living in rural India are unaware about disability and their rehabilitation mainly children with cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation, Autism and multiple disability.

To cater the need of the children with MR, CP, MD and autism RARE initiate a mobile van services named BHINAKHAMA SEVA O SAHAYATA EXPRESS. The objective of the initiation is

- To identify the CwDs at earliest
- To create awareness
- To create a system of Referral services
- To promote inclusiveness
- To facilitate door steep rehabilitation services
- To create a network with village service provider

Bhinnakshama Seva O Sahayata Express started its journey to serve the children with disability on 10th March 2018. Every Saturday it's reached a village and does the following activities.

Activities Undertaken

- Meeting with Aganwadi Workers, ASHA and visiting school for identification of children with disability
- Public meeting for Awareness creation

- Home visit to the families of CwDs
- Providing counseling services
- Providing Occupational and Physiotherapy services
- Providing need based referral services

Achievement

- 30 children with disabilities identified
- 116 number of people including parents of CwDs aware on disabilities and services available at different level
- Home based physiotherapy and rehabilitation therapy provided to 10 children with MR and CP and counseled them to attend the Day Care Centre regularly.
- 23 parents are aware on services available in the locality and different govt. Provisions for person with disability.
- 30 persons got disability certificate with the support of Bhinnakshama Seva O Sahayata Express.

COVID 19 Support Grant:

To bring an inspiration and cope with the post COVID Situation RARE had requested to Azim Premji Foundation, Bangalore for dry ration kit support to the COVID affected people. Based on the request Azim Premji Foundation had supported 631 families whose details are as follows;
